Uxbridge rower going for Pan Am gold

A former Uxbridge Secondary School student will be on the Canadian rowing team for the Pan Am Games, which begin tomorrow in Lima, Peru. And rowing for Canada in Peru is one step closer to Jaclyn Stelmaszyk's dream of being on the Canadian Olympic team in Tokyo in 2020.

Stelmaszyk (née Halko) rows in the Lightweight Ladies Doubles Rowing category with rowing partner Kate Huber. The pair won gold in the Challenge West/BC Championships, held in British Columbia last weekend.

Stelmaszyk began rowing in 2004 with the USS Rowing Tigers. After completing her education, she traveled to Poland to continue her rowing career. While there, she worked at an internship for the non-profit organization, Athletes in Action. The Polish Rowing Federation also offered Stelmaszyk international rac-

ing experience that she felt she would not have had in Canada. She has since competed in Hungary, Poland, Germany, Australia, and the United States, earning medals all along the

Former USS Rowing Tigers coach Sue Palmer has kept in touch with Stelmaszyk, following her successes and experiences.

"Jackie uses her experience and expertise to empower other women in sport, and she especially focusses on her family who, in turn, support her," explains Palmer. "As a volunteer guest athlete for Fast and Female [a charity whose mission is to keep girls healthy and active in sports by introducing girls ages 8-14 to inspiring athlete role models like Stelmaszyk at events all over North America], she encourages girls to play different types of sports. Rowing, empowering female athletes, family. Those are Jaclyn's priorities, although not necessarily in that order!"

Although Stelmaszyk, her husband and their one-year old daughter call Uxbridge home, Stelmaszyk has been intensively training with the Team Canada rowing team in Victoria,

Stelmaszyk's placement on Team Canada for the Pan Am Games does not guarantee her a spot on the team for the Olympics, although it is a major plus. The World Championships later this year are the qualifier for the Olympic

An event supporting Stelmaszyk in her Olympic aspirations will be held after her return from Peru, on Sat., Aug. 17 at the Latcham Centre in Port Perry. This semi-formal dinner and silent auction, co-hosted by Stelmaszyk and the Durham Rowing Club, will feature Toronto Raptors home game announcer Herbie Kuhn as guest speaker.

Our two cents

Getting back on track

The Cosmos has covered the goings on of the York Durham Heritage Railway (YDHR) a lot lately, and it appears that we've gotten our wires (or our tracks) crossed a bit when reporting on Uxbridge's heritage train organization. Since some of the issues don't quite fit into a small "Corrections" notice, we thought we'd address them here, and get things, to extend the metaphor, back on

Back in April of this year, YDHR announced that a new CEO had come on board to help steer the organization in a new, dynamic direction. Randy Bird, who had come from Waterloo Central Railway, had big ideas for YDHR, approaching the township with talk of Disney-style entertainment, more themed train rides, and visions of overhauling the downtown railway yard, which included installing fencing and more parking. He also said that YDHR would have a payroll of around \$500,000. This number piqued our interest, of course: how could this seemingly low-key, low-budget operation have such a huge payroll? And what were all these grandiose plans going to do to, or for, our YDHR?

The Cosmos started to ask questions, but Mr. Bird never made himself available to answer them for us. Then, in June, it was announced that Mr. Bird had left YDHR because, as president Ron Layton put it, he had been "trying to make YDHR his own," and not following the organization's vision.

We were having difficulty pinning down what exactly was happening within the ranks at YDHR, and our confusion led to reporting the following: that YDHR was operating as a business, and that it had a payroll of almost half a million dollars.

Enter John Perks. Mr. Perks is now the executive director for YDHR, and he recently visited us for a delightful chat, and to set the record straight.

York Durham Heritage Railway is, as Mr. Perks explained to us, "a nonprofit organization that is running as a business." Its mandate is "to preserve and promote the heritage of Canadian railways of South-Central Ontario." (ydhr.ca) Mr. Perks also made clear that the \$500,000 figure that we were using encompasses "operations and staffing" for YDHR; it is not all going strictly to payroll.

"York Durham Heritage Railway is a million dollar operation," said Mr. Perks. "There have been so many changes lately because it had outgrown the structure needed to support it from within."

We recognize that YDHR does a great deal for Uxbridge – it brings in thousands of tourists over the year, what with Thomas the Train, a Wizards Festival, the Santa Train, and other themed events. It gives train enthusiasts a destination. It gave Canada Day \$12,000 (and asked for donations during the event, and said that donation money would go towards giving Day Out with Thomas tickets to less fortunate children. Give-take-give again).

Mr. Perks made it quite clear that he is open to any questions the media or anyone else may have for YDHR. "We want to be accountable to the public, and fair on all sides" were his exact words.

The Cosmos wants to be fair to YDHR too, that's why we're writing this. We hope that this clears up any misunderstandings caused by unclear reporting, and when future news about YDHR comes up, the Cosmos will ensure that its information stays "on track".

Am I Wrong?

Where do you get YOUR news?

Were any of you aware that the Uxbridge Cottage Hospital was without running water for several hours a week ago? I learned about it the day it happened.

How many of you knew that part of the trail system in the Fields of Uxbridge was cordoned off because a giant hogweed - a particularly nasty type of weed that can cause serious burns - was discovered along the trail? I learned about it the same day I heard about the hospital's

How did I hear these two pieces of news? On Facebook and Twitter.

As I understand it, the water shut-off at the hospital was planned and not the result of an emergency. So why did the Markham Stouffville Hospital, with whom the Uxbridge Cottage Hospital partners, think the best way to inform people of possible inconvenience was to post the fact on social media the day it was happening? Wouldn't it have made more sense and reached more people if they had let the local news media know in advance?

As for the hogweed, couldn't the township that claims to be the Trail Capital of Canada have informed the local news media about it so they in turn could warn all potential users to be careful using that particular trail, instead of just the few who might have seen it on Facebook?

The trend towards using social media for this type of announcement has been growing by leaps and bounds for some time now, especially by government and quasi-government institutions. But they ignore one obvious fact: unless you have chosen to "follow" these accounts on Facebook or Twitter, you're not going to see their announcements. On the other hand, if the two aforementioned entities had shared their news with the local media, it's almost guaranteed that every household in the township would have been informed of the water woes and the giant hogweed, one way or another.

It's the particular job of newspapers to let people know what's going on, either locally via community newspapers, or nationally/internationally via major operations like the dailies. Using social media to inform the public of current events is a hit-or-miss prospect at best. You put your post out there without having any real idea who will see it or where it will travel. But newspapers, generally, have a specific audience and, once published, they can't be tampered with or altered.

Newspapers have been around for over 400 years. Apparently, Johann Carolus published the first weekly newspaper, called *Relation aller Fürnemmen und gedenckwürdigen Historien* (Ac-

count of all distinguished and commemorable news) in Antwerp in 1605. It is recognized by the World Association of Newspapers as the world's first newspaper. Despite the recent gloom-and-doom news about the newspaper industry, I simply cannot envisage a world where newspapers are no longer important or relevant, particularly community newspapers. Where else would you learn of goings on at council, the details of forthcoming community events, what's happening with local service clubs and sports teams or what new groups have been formed? You won't hear about those things on the television, perhaps not on radio news - or social media.

Newspapers are also about the only resource most people have for expressing their opinions, by way of letters to the editor. Obviously, one can post one's opinions on social media, but in doing so one leaves oneself open to insults, name-calling and derogatory comments from so-called trolls. One only has to briefly peruse the comments section of on-line news stories to know that there are legions of people just ready and waiting to jump all over your opinion. Not so in the letters to the editor: if someone wishes to respond to your published letter, you can be sure the editor will not allow personal attacks and insults.

Of course, I have a personal interest in the continuation of newspapers. I started in the news game as a copy boy with the Canadian Press when I was only 16 years old. It was, quite simply, the only business I was interested in. There have been a couple of blips along the way, but basically I have spent the best part of the last 62 years writing news. I came to this love of newspapers at an early age: we had a newspaper delivered every morning, every evening and three on weekends and I read them all. Given that background, I would be devastated if newspapers were to completely vanish.

Most of you may be far less enthused about newspapers than I, but think for a few minutes about what life would be like if you didn't have access to a community newspaper. It's likely you would have to do some rummaging to find out when the Santa Claus parade will pass through town, what plays are showing at the Music Hall, what new bylaws have been passed and, more importantly, what's happening with the latest township budget. It seems to me, those who use social media to spread their news are just throwing it in the wind, hoping it will land where they want it to land.

The 'just in time' mentality

Over coffee the other day, some friends shared an experience about modern-day delivery. A clothes washer had broken down at their house, so they weighed their options. Junk the old one and buy new, or try to extend the life of the old washer by attempting a repair. Not surprisingly, my friend went online, learned about the problem and determined that a \$10 part might repair the washer. The question was: How long would it take the part to arrive? It was a Saturday, but he ordered the part anyway.

"They guaranteed next-day delivery," he said, then added sarcastically, "Sunday delivery? Not likely. Sure enough, though, next day we got back from church and this van pulled up to deliver the part. Couldn't believe it!"

I couldn't either. In fact, my friend and I both wondered how expensive it must have been to have that washer part sourced in Mississauga, Ont., loaded on a truck, transported across the GTA, and then hand-delivered on a Sunday to a home in Uxbridge. I mean the cost of the gas round-trip alone would have totalled \$100, and minimum wage for the driver for several hours, another \$100. And I thought, is the race for my business that cutthroat these days that a firm has to deliver a \$10 part within a day to Uxbridge in order to stay competitive? And from the customer's perspective, is it that vital for me to have that washer part, a piece of clothing, a household accessory, a book, a CD ... that fast, for me to remain loyal to a business?

I guess it's a sign of the times. I'm old enough to remember when mail ordering by so-called "snail mail" was a phenomenon. As a kid, I could clip a coupon from the back of a comic book and send in for sea-monkeys or a replica of the Polaris nuclear submarine. The days/weeks of anticipation nearly drove me crazy. But, oh, the satisfaction when they arrived, somehow made the experience of receiving them all the more rewarding. I used to send away for "first day covers," when postage stamps were first issued from Ottawa or U.S. locations, or the United Nations; receiving the brand-new stamps with special cancellation on the envelope at my home address or the post box was the equivalent of a Christmas present from the post office.

When we lived on a farm near Bethany, and later on an acreage outside Saskatoon, each

spring I even mail-ordered evergreen trees – pines and spruces. I guess if I ordered such things today they'd come to me in some hightech box for greenery, again overnight. But back in the 1960s and '70s, once the order was ready, we actually had to travel to the Lands & Forests tree farm where the seedlings had been planted and bring home bundles of trees in the back of the truck, all ready for planting.

Somehow part of the joy of ordering these things – sea monkeys, sub replicas or Christmas trees – came from the anticipation and often the hands-on ways in which we brought things home to be enjoyed. All of this is lost today in a "just in time" and "overnight delivery guarantee" environment.

In contrast to my friend's surprisingly rapid receipt of his clothes washer part, this week, a couple of weeks ago, I went to a local automotive repair shop in town. The air conditioner in my car had decided to die just as the recent heat wave began. The mechanic quickly located the problem. He said that the high-pressure liquid line – a narrow tube – connecting the condenser and the evaporator - two vital parts of the A/C unit – needed to be replaced.

"OK," I said. "When can you fix it?"

"I can't right now," he said. "I checked for the part and they told me, 'There are none in North America.' I couldn't believe it either."

It occurred to me, on the other side of that overnight delivery guarantee that my friend enjoyed, is a 21st century system that produces parts on a "just in time" basis, meaning that with rapid delivery, a manufacturer can delay making a part (i.e. save money) until the very last minute. Then, when an order arrives, s/he makes the part, quickly sends it to a distributor and completes the delivery overnight. Except that in this case, it's likely that the auto builder had not anticipated a sudden call for high-pressure liquid lines (i.e. their design suddenly experienced failure all over North America at the same time) and they couldn't cope with the surge in demand. Now weeks later, we're still in a heat wave. I have no part and no car A/C. I've found myself wishing my clothes washer had broken down instead of the air conditioner in my car.


