

Uxbridge's giving heart ranks tops in Canada

If you gave to charity in 2021, you will have contributed to Uxbridge's top ranking among Canadian cities that donated the most money in 2021, according to CanadaHelps.

According to a snapshot report released last week by CanadaHelps, a registered charity that works to connect donors and charities, Uxbridge ranked first in Ontario and third in Canada, based on dollars donated (\$36 per citizen). It ranked first in Canada based on dollars per donor, with a value of \$1,000 per donation,

"Many charities have seen an increase in de-

mand for their services, and 42 per cent of charities are not able to meet the current level of demand," said the report. "However, Canadians have stepped up to help those in need. As of Nov. 30, 2021, \$304 million in donations have been made through CanadaHelps."

The organization also noted that, in 2021, Canadians were making multiple donations, up 87.2 per cent from last year. Monthly giving is also on the rise, making up just over 10 per cent of all donations. More donors are reported to be leveraging the extra tax benefits of security donations. Amid those who have increased their donation this year, 17 per cent are in the 18-34 age group, the highest increase in the

The Cosmos checked with some local charitable organizations and found that this trend didn't necessarily prove true across the board, perhaps indicating that the dollars aren't always staying in Uxbridge.

Mona Emond, executive director of North House, said, "We had a larger donation amount in 2020 than in 2021. We are showing a 7.32 per cent decrease in online donations through CanadaHelps. Overall, our donations by mail (cheque) has seen an increase by 13.25 per cent in 2021 versus 2020."



From the Tax Office

FIRST Tax Installment is due on February 24, 2022.

SECOND Tax Installment is due on April 27, 2022

2022 Interim Property Tax Bills have been mailed for all properties, with exception of properties enrolled in the Monthly Pre-Authorized Payment Plan or tax bills paid by Mortgage companies.

The taxes due are based on the billing date. If your account is currently in arrears, the February 1st interest charge on "Past Due Taxes" is not included on this bill and will need to be paid in addition to the February installment.

Tax Payments Options:

- In person at Town Hall during regular business hours of Monday to Friday 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. Accepted payment methods are cash, cheque, or Interac debit. All visitors to Town Hall must sign the COVID Contact Tracking sheet, wear a mask, and sanitize their
- In an after-hours Drop Box located in the Municipal Office front parking lot. - DO NOT DEPOSIT CASH Post-dated cheques are accepted.
- By Mail Payments must reach the Municipal Office by the due date.
- Through Internet or Telephone Banking.
- At most Financial Institutions.
- Credit cards and e-transfers are not accepted for tax payments.

Penalty/Interest Charges:

For non-payment of a tax levy on or before the respective due dates of each installment, a penalty of 1.25% shall be imposed on the first day of each calendar month and thereafter in which the default continues. Failure to receive a Tax Bill does not excuse the taxpayer from responsibility for payment of taxes nor liability of any penalty or interest due to late payments.

The penalty/interest charges cannot be waived or reduced by the Tax Department or Council for any reason.

If a reprinted tax bill, receipt or Statement of Account is required for any year's taxes, a fee of \$15.00 will apply. If you did not receive your 2022 Interim Tax Bill, please call the Tax Department at 905-852-9181.

of Precious Minds, said the overall donations seemed to stay consistent throughout the year, but that they did see an increase through local organizations and local fundraising campaigns, like their golf tournament, which raised "significantly more than anticipated."

One charity speculated that reaching younger donors may be a side effect of going virtual as a result of the pandemic.

"I have noticed that we have connected with a younger generation of donors because of this online avenue and being able to promote through Facebook and Instagram, which tends to have more young users," said Esther Veens, program coordinator for Sunrise Pregnancy and Family Support Services.

Veens also said that 2021 saw a higher demand for services, which Veens says have "absolutely been exacerbated by the pandemic."

Mackenzie Todd, events and development officer for the Jennifer Ashleigh Children's Charity, said they have also seen a "significantly greater" need for their services since

the beginning of the pandemic. "Many parents who were laid off due to COVID have not been able to return, either because their child is immune compromised and it is not safe, or because there is no longer a job to return back to."

Todd saids that, like with all charities, fundraising has become difficult and they have had to learn to pivot the way they reach their donor and client families.

Veens agreed with this, saying, "We have had to be creative in how we support our families throughout COVID, to meet families where they are and to ensure no one falls through the cracks!

"We are so thankful for the support of this community that allows us to offer these services, as our financial support comes solely from local businesses, foundations, churches and individuals," said Veens.

Car robberies part of 'sophisticated auto theft ring'

An Uxbridge man is among those accused and charged in what police are calling a "sophisticated auto theft ring" in the Greater Toronto Area.

Project High 5, an investigation project led by Peel Regional Police, was a six-month long investigation, beginning after police from across the GTA began reporting an increase in car thefts. After the execution of nine search warrants on Jan. 29, police stated that there was a recovery of 217 stolen vehicles valued at more than \$11 million. This led to the arrests of 24 suspects, facing a total of 321 charges. Jahid Golan, 21, of Uxbridge, was among those arrested, with a reported 18 charges.

Police say the suspects acted at night, forcing open drivers' doors and obtaining access to the vehicle's on board diagnostic port. The thieves would then use key programming devices to program a

new aftermarket key fob before loading the vehicles onto shipping containers to sell in the United States and multiple West African and Middle Eastern Countries.

"These arrests and seizures are an impressive demonstration of the value of collaboration between the Peel Regional Police, our policing partners, and our community," said Nick Milinovich, Peel's deputy chief of Investigative and Emergency Services. "It has resulted in successfully dismantling one of the most prolific organized crime rings in the Greater Toronto Area. The results are unparalleled."

Also seized were a loaded handgun, drugs, fraudulent documents and more than \$100,000 in cash deemed proceeds of crime, police said.

Apologies for being a NIMBY numpty

It would appear that all things trucks/truckers are in the news these days. Nationally, they're leading the news cycle at the moment, and taking up valuable real estate in Ottawa (we say it like that because downtown Ottawa doesn't have a lot of road space on a normal day. Pack it with various sizes of transport trucks and the downtown becomes impassable). Now don't fret, we're not going to go into how we feel about the "Freedom Convoy 2022" or this past weekend's events on Parliament Hill. We're worried once we start, we may not stop. Suffice to say, it was NOT Canada's finest moment on display to the world.

Locally, trucks and their travel routes have been a source of consternation for, quite literally, decades. They are, dare we say it, a necessary evil - we need them to transport goods, to bring us what we want and need. But we don't want them rumbling through the middle of our downtown, kicking up dust and drowning out our conversations.

A few weeks ago, in this space, we brought attention to a letter that was submitted to council by a Goodwood resident, calling for action to be taken on the trucks travelling along what has for years been a truck by-pass which routes the trucks away from downtown Uxbridge. In the letter, the resident was clear they didn't want trucks on the by-pass route either.

Our response to this letter was, in hindsight, rather acerbic, and we would like to sincerely apologize to the resident for singling out their letter. We meant no disrespect to the individual, or to Goodwood, for that matter. When something fires us up, we try to take a step back and let cooler heads prevail; we obviously didn't allow enough time to elapse between the stepback and the writing of that editorial.

That said, we do stand by what else we said in that piece - we *cannot* shove the truck problem into other people's backyards. The township has spent years trying to come up with solutions that will satisfy downtown, out-of-town, truck drivers, etc., and no one thing will satisfy all of the above. The trucks need somewhere to travel along when they're not sitting in downtown Ottawa, kicking up dust and drowning out conversations.












Helping the Earth to Heal, One Yard at a Time

There's a new movement afoot! In the early part of the 1900's, Ontario realized pioneer agricultural clearances had devastated the environment. Durham Regional Forest was established to help heal a seriously eroded landscape. Many landowners did their part to plant their land to help it recover. It was trees, trees and more trees that were needed to rehabilitate the land. But in modern times, we are experiencing another kind of depletion. We have grass, grass, everywhere and not enough

Douglas Tallamy, a conservationist from Delaware, is promoting a new

kind of movement, it's conservation that starts in your yard. Dr. Tallamy has written a number of books, his latest being Nature's Best Hope - A New Approach to Conservation That Starts in Your Yard. This movement doesn't rely on the government to solve the problems of biodiversity loss alone. He calls for a grassroots approach for lot owners to take part in preserving and enhancing local nature by turning some part of their yards into conservation corridors for wildlife habitats.

If you want to play a role in healing the earth, why not put in a native plant garden this year that includes wildflowers, grasses, a tree or shrub and possibly some mosses? This February and March, North

Durham Nature club (northdurhamnature.com) will be selling wildflower seeds as a fundraiser.

Our seed collection includes plants from former board member Brenda Near's garden, which won an award with the North American Native Plant Society (NANPS) last fall. You can see Brenda's garden at: youtube.com/watch?v=pUHEOeS6

NANPS has also been working with the David Suzuki Foundation to develop a workshop series for both collecting and growing native plants from seed. You can sign up for a workshop at:

Buying from our club will allow you to skip the collection phase of the project and move right into the growing stage. Native plants almost always need to experience winter before they will germinate. They need to be "stratified" first, which means you must fool them into thinking winter has passed. The workshop listed above will explain how this works or you can read how to prepare your seeds on our seed packages. YouTube also has lots of information about how you can grow your own patch of nature in your yard.

We hope you'll consider growing some of Ontario's lovely flowers this

A little oasis of sanity

On the weekend, Uxbridge was a veritable montage of Currier and Ives and Norman Rockwell.

Down on Elgin Pond, a fair number of people were enjoying the ice, either on the hockey surface that has been cleared or the skating track that encircles it. Some were taking it easy on lawn chairs as they enjoyed the sunny weather. Up at the off-leash dog park, a large contingent of dogs romped in wild abandon, playing and running as though there was no tomorrow.

Over at the toboggan hill by the arena on Tuesday, a young man set up a seven-rung step ladder with a slide running down one side. Balancing precariously on the top rung, he slid down the ramp on his snowboard, raced through the splash pad and soared over one of the pieces of equipment in daredevil fashion.

All around town, people were enjoying Elgin Park, the trails and Quaker Common.

This seeming tranquility was in sharp contrast to the absolute craziness that seems to have engulfed most of the rest of the world.

Many words have already been written about the truck convoy that descended on Ottawa and, as is usually the case, the media took a lambasting from some quarters over their coverage. To hear many of the truckers' supporters, including some members of the Conservative caucus in Parliament, the media was biased because they reported on swastikaemblazoned flags, Confederate flags and the desecration of monuments such as the Terry Fox statue and the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier. Too bad they can't sit in on a few editorial meetings. I know that at the Cosmos, we are constantly discussing ethics and whether our reporting is fair and balanced and devoid of bias. But it has become commonplace now for the media to be denigrated when someone doesn't like what we are reporting about. Indeed, a number of reporters were harassed and spit on while covering the truck convoy in Ottawa.

Down south, the craziness has reached epic proportions. In what other country could a disgraced former president announce - (and get away with it) - that, if he is elected again,

he may pardon anyone who took part in a criminal insurrection in Washington over a year ago? Millions of people watched Jan. 6, 2021, when Trump and his cronies stood in front of the insurrectionists and urged them to descend on the Capitol and block the election process and yet the ringleaders all remain free, unhindered in their continuing attack on U.S. democracy. Not even Kafka would believe it.

In the United Kingdom, the royal family is lurching from one scandal to the next to such an extent that there is now serious discussion about the future of the monarchy. Presumably, such discussion would include one Boris Johnson, who's had enough scandals of his own, including the revelation that a series of parties were held at 10 Downing Street while the rest of the country suffered through a lockdown.

And, on top of it all, the COVID-19 pandemic continues relatively unabated and the messaging coming in from various points around the world shows the craziness continues. While some jurisdictions continue with varying degrees of restrictions, some are throwing them out all together. So what is Joe Average supposed to do? How can anyone be expected to make a reasonably informed decision about their health when we get different messages thrown at us non-stop?

Indeed, it's becoming more and more difficult to make informed and rational decisions about anything these days as reasoned discourse is drowned out by the ranting and raving of people who are interested only in their own agenda, rather than the good of society. And, although Uxbridge is, to all intents and purposes, a small oasis of sanity in a world gone mad, even here we can see a fair amount of ranting and raving on local social media groups.

It seems to me that the world is in dire need of intelligent discussion and debate, but, as we have seen to often of late, even those with unquestionable qualifications are subject to abuse and threats from the uninformed.

As Scrooge said in *A Christmas Carol*: "I think I'll retire to bedlam."

Slain by symbolism

He thought he was standing up for rights and freedoms in Canada. And last Saturday, Michael Cooper, the MP for St. Albert-Edmonton constituency, wanted to be seen while saying so. Thousands of people blocked the streets of Ottawa with trucks and demonstrations as part of a so-called "Freedom Convoy" to protest vaccine mandates and other restrictions in response to the COVID pandemic. And Cooper chose to join the demonstrations and speak to the media, which is what all politicians do when they feel they're on the right side of history.

"(People are) just here to send a message to the prime minister," Cooper said as the CBC TV camera rolled.

But what the Alberta MP had not planned was the backdrop to his statement. Fluttering in the breeze immediately behind him was an upside-down Canadian flag which was also desecrated with a swastika. Well, reaction was swift. The mayors of both St. Albert and Edmonton (part of Cooper's federal constituency) issued a joint statement.

"We want the rest of the country to know that MP Cooper's presence at this rally in no way reflects the values of Edmontonians and St. Albertans," proclaimed mayors Amarjeet Sohi and Cathy Heron respectively.

Whether he wanted it or not, Cooper's stance was indelibly associated with that swastika. Since the incident, MP Cooper has tried to distance himself from the rally, its participants, and the inappropriate juxtaposition of a federally elected representative decrying Justin Trudeau, the COVID vaccine mandate for Canadian truckers while standing in front of a symbol of oppression and hate. To his credit, Cooper's office quickly released an unequivocal statement, that "Nazism is the purest form of evil and I have always condemned it." But the damage may haunt him, says political scientist Duane Bratt, of the University of Calgary. "You could have expected something like this when you wade into a protest."

Such is the danger of speaking out, demonstrating, or politicking in association with provocative symbols in the vicinity. And the swastika was not the only inappropriate symbolism to emerge from the weekend demo in Ottawa. Another group of protesters, claiming they were supporting the truckers, draped an upside-down Maple Leaf over the statue of Terry Fox near Parliament Hill, and hung a "Mandate Freedom" placard on it. Still others

paraded along Wellington Street with Confederate flags. And some "Freedom Convoy" demonstrators chose to park their vehicles on the grounds of the national cenotaph, some dancing and shouting on the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier.

Justin Trudeau blamed the abhorrent behaviour on a "fringe minority."

Erin O'Toole called the truckers "heroes, period!" Such allegiance makes or breaks political

Meanwhile, if we cared to check out what the leader of the convoy, Dave Steenburg was saying, we'd find his TikTok video "calling all Canadians ... to stand up and fight for our country," with a text of his fomenting comments scrolled over the Viking-head logo of the Soldiers of Odin – an anti-immigrant group that has clashed with anti-racism groups.

Logos, symbols, flags and mottos – all intended to make clear statements, but most misinterpreted when attached to the cause of freedom.

I remember the early 1970s, when student movements took to the streets of most North American cities to protest war, racism and pollution of the planet. I participated in several. Well, one Saturday in Toronto, a peaceful demonstration up University Avenue to the U.S. embassy suddenly attracted everybody and every cause. I remember marching with a "Give Peace a Chance" placard and suddenly next to me was a guy with a Marxist-Leninist flag and another with a placard protesting the Armenian genocide.

As the police tried to keep a lid on things, some demonstrators in hoodies and masks began smashing windows and tossing ink bottles at buildings. I was stunned, mortified, angry that my intentions had been hijacked by those with no peaceful intentions at all.

And then there's the man who gave extremism a licence to go centre stage, former president Donald Trump. At a rally in Texas earlier this week, Trump hinted, if re-elected in 2024, he'd pardon those convicted of sedition at the Jan. 6 riots on Capitol Hill last year. Then, he proclaimed, "We want those great Canadian truckers to know that we are with them all the way."

Be careful what you campaign for. The uncontrollable influence of symbolism may undo the best of intentions.


