Major funding announcement pushes future of hospital to next step

Funding of \$2.5 million for a new Uxbridge Hospital was announced Friday on the grounds of the current hospital.

Facing a bank of television cameras, Health Minister Christine Elliott and Finance Minister Peter Bethlenfalvy shared the spotlight as they announced the funding, which will be used to expand and enhance Oak Valley Health's Uxbridge Site, known locally as Uxbridge Cottage Hospital.

Combined with funding of \$500,000 announced in 2019, the total \$3 million will be used to support the planning for the campus, which will see a new long-term care home with 92 beds, a major redevelopment of the hospital, which will include an additional 11 new beds, and an ambulatory care building. The new long-term care home will bring Uxbridge's

total long-term care beds to 192.

Elliott said the new funding will allow continued planning for new interconnected facilities which will reduce wait times for patients and expand services.

Bethlenfalvy said the redevelopment will improve access to care for Uxbridge residents and the new development will form a hub model of care.

On hand for the announcement were Mayor Dave Barton and members of council, Regional Chair John Henry, Jo-anne Marr, president of Oak Valley Health, and hospital staff. Marr remarked at one point in the ceremonies that "it wasn't long ago that we were worried about the future of this hospital."

As part of the announcement - and to underscore the importance of the Uxbridge hospital to the community - local resident and former patient Chrissy Farrell spoke of her experience eight years ago. She was rushed to the hospital by her husband after becoming unresponsive, where she was first treated by Dr. Jennifer Wilson and Dr. Michael Damus, who placed her on life support. Soon after arrival, Farrell was flown to then Markham Stouffville Hospital by helicopter, where she was placed in a medically induced coma. She was diagnosed with bacterial meningitis. Farrell credited the assistance she received at the Uxbridge hospital with saving her life.

"Those moments in the Uxbridge hospital gave me a second chance," she said. "This hospital is small, but its people are mighty."

Councillor Bruce Garrod, chair of the finance committee, said Friday's announcement was "the biggest announcement in Uxbridge in decades."



Our two cents

Book banning - right here at home


We recently read an article in the Saturday Star regarding books that have been banned by the Durham District School Board. You read that correctly - this isn't a book banning in some ultra-right leaning state south of the border, it's a ban by the very school board that runs the majority of the schools in this township. Et tu, Brute?

The story goes that the board apparently pulled several books from school libraries claiming they contain "content that could be harmful to Indigenous students and families." The kicker - among these books is "The Great Bear" by Cree writer David A. Robertson. Robertson is quoted in the article as saying he wrote the book for Indigenous youth and families, and that he is "at a loss" to understand what the DDSB could possibly have found offensive. "The Great Bear" was shortlisted for the Ontario Library Association's Silver Birch Award, and was named one of the Canadian Children's Book Centre's favourite books of the year.

It's great that the DDSB has some input and oversight into what can be found on the shelves of public school libraries across the region. No one wants smut or rubbish available to our youth, especially when those youth are reaching for a book and not their phones. But it's a pretty slippery slope when books are being pulled because they "don't align with the recently updated DDSB Indigenous Education policy and procedure"... but were written by an Indigenous person for Indigenous people. Is the DDSB succumbing to the dark side, overstepping its bounds by making decisions that are better left to parents, guardians or - a radical thought - the youthful readers themselves? If they have questions, then adults should be ready to answer them, not spirit the material away and pretend that it never existed. How on Earth will they learn? How will they form knowledgeable, thoughtful opinions about issues that may directly affect them? How will they grow into sensible, well-rounded, educated adults?

Book banning is censorship, plain and simple. And when it comes to the Indigenous community specifically, it's likely that it wants to decide what is or isn't offensive to its people. It's absolutely *not* up to a school board. The DDSB isn't helping with truth and reconciliation with First Nations when it pulls a stunt like this, it's halting it, harming it, insulting it.

Like so many other knee-jerk decisions being made nowadays that make no sense whatsoever (got that license plate rebate cheque yet?), this appears to be a case of idiocy trumps common sense. And there ain't no book in any library that can combat that.

Am I Wrong?

You can't tell the players without a program

As of this Sunday, the provincial general election campaign in Ontario officially kicks off. Most of you are probably wondering - (if you're thinking about the election at all) - which party/candidate you will support: Conservative, Liberal, NDP or Green.

But hold on, folks: if that is where your thinking stops, you're short-changing your-self. Apparently, there are no less than 23 parties running candidates who will be seeking your vote. Since, like me, you probably haven't even heard of most (any) of them, let me introduce to you just a few.

To start with, two of the new parties were founded by disgruntled former members of established parties, much like Maxime Bernier started the People's Party of Canada after losing his bid for leadership of the Conservative Party.

The Ontario Party is headed by Derek Sloan, a former Conservative MP who was kicked out of that caucus. He is an opponent of COVID-19 public-health measures and has promoted anti-vaccine talking points. Just this week, Sloan announced his party has hired the infamous Roger Stone as the party's strategic planning consultant. Stone, a close ally of Donald Trump, was convicted on seven felony counts and later pardoned by Trump.

Then there's the New Blue Party of Ontario. This party, started by MPP Belinda Karahelios, states openly on its web page that Doug Ford's Progressive Conservative Party actually supports the Liberals. Karahelios was kicked out of Ford's caucus after voting against a government bill. She and her husband say the Conservatives aren't blue enough!

Also for your consideration is a party that claims it isn't a political party at all. Consensus Ontario says its candidates are all independent and, should they form a government, the elected representatives will choose a premier from among their ranks. And yet the Consensus Ontario web site lists Brad Harness of London as its "leader." If it's not an organized party, how can it have a leader?

Some of the registered parties sound so bizarre it's difficult not to believe they are some kind of joke, as their names indicate: Stop the New Sex-Ed Agenda; the Pauper Party of Ontario; the Party for People With Special Needs; None of the Above Direct Democracy Party; Go Vegan. It is difficult to imagine anyone actually casting a vote for a candidate from any of these organizations, even a candidate's mother.

On top of these, there are other fringe parties that have been around for a few years but apparently still haven't absorbed the message that no one wants them: e.g.: the Communist Party and the Ontario Libertarian Party.

One is tempted to laugh out loud and dismiss all these would-be vote getters out of hand. The danger there is that being dismissive can come back to haunt us. Witness Donald Trump's election as president. Throughout the long, long presidential campaign, from the primaries to the presidential debates, most of us laughed at the orange clown. And yet he won. And witness how quickly the Republican party has followed him down the rabbit hole, with the result that many Republican states have now banned abortions outright, a lot of states have returned to banning books, a Republican governor has retaliated against a company (Disney) that dared to criticize him and the Republican Party actually claims the Jan. 6, 2021, insurrection was "legitimate political discourse.'

But one does muse about a future with one of the above-named parties in power. Would a Go Vegan government ban all beef, dairy and poultry operations in the province? Would a government led by the Party for People With Special Needs require all parking lots to have 80 per cent of their spots marked for disabled parking only? Would a Pauper Party government bring in legislation forcing everyone to live on a subsistence budget? The mind boggles at the possibilities.

Whatever party wins the upcoming election, the province will have to live with the result for the next four years and either cheer or moan about the legislation the winner brings forth. It seems to me there's enough confusion just sorting through the platforms of the four main parties. Bringing all these others into the mix is not going to make the waters any less muddy.

Adapting to saving the planet

I've never been afraid to seek advice, particularly when it comes to legal matters, health care or buying a car. Several weeks ago, I raised the challenge of buying an electric or hybrid car in front of some knowledgeable friends. I play summer hockey with a group of men almost all of whom have worked in the automobile industry all their lives. When I asked what make and model of electric or hybrid car I should consider, just about all of them had the same answer:

"Within a year or 18 months," they said, "they'll all be making EVs (electric vehicles) of some sort. Not just Tesla, Toyota and Hyundai. Everybody."

My wife and I have contemplated what direction we might take in the purchase of our next car, when one or both of our two Japanese-manufactured gas-powered cars expires. I was surprised to learn that the internal combustion engine has been around for over 150 years. (According to Google, Belgian inventor Étienne Lenoir used a turpentine derivative fuel to power the engine on his three-wheeled "hippomobile" in 1863; he got about nine kilometres on the tank of fuel driving from Paris to Joinville-le-Pont and back). And we've been hooked on gas-fuelled engines ever since

One of the experts there in the hockey dressing room later sent me some links to sites explaining the concepts and technology of both fully electric and hybrid cars (vehicles that have the facility to function on battery power or gas power). He pointed out that not only are such cars leading the curve toward Canada's carbon-neutral environmental targets, but the government (not the province, but the federal) is also offering rebates (up to \$2,500) depending on whether you're leasing or financing the purchase.

On my own, I searched out a number of websites exploring the pros and cons of both electric and hybrid vehicles. Naturally, you have to recognize who is actually providing the assessment. According to the Electric Vehicle Society, fully electric cars offer the best driving experience, added safety (because battery packs give the car added rigidity), greater reliability (gas cars have 2,000 moving parts, electrics about 20), cheaper maintenance and higher resale value. On the con side, EVS admits the upfront purchase price is prohibitive; an American site claims the next generation

of electrical vehicles will sell in the \$35,000 range (that's nearly \$45,000 Canadian).

But here's the big question for fully electric models: How can I be sure I'll make it out and back on one charge? Or, can I depend on finding enough recharging centres? An expert I heard on CBC claimed the projected 50,000 charging stations across Canada need to be 50,000 across Ontario in order to make EV driving in this province as convenient as driving our old gas guzzlers.

On the hybrid side of the ledger, the facility to go either way makes the charging-station availability a non-issue – when the battery runs dry, the gas engine kicks in and gets you home. Another of my hockey pals said he drove to Ottawa and back with his hybrid on less than a quarter tank of fuel. Hybrid engines, says Economical, the Canadian insurance company, aren't responsible for running the vehicle on its own, so hybrid engines tend to be smaller, lighter and more efficient. On the downside, hybrids still emit harmful emissions; their engines have a higher up-front cost; if you drive longer distances, you'll still end up consuming a lot of gas to keep the battery topped up; and, a common problem apparently, hybrid engines don't accelerate as well as gas engines or offer the same kind of driving experience.

A case in point. Last fall, I travelled to Alberta, rented a car and discovered in the parking garage it was a hybrid. I was excited at the prospect of acquiring first-hand knowledge. I was surprised how well it handled, how little fuel it consumed, and how similar it felt to my exclusively gas-powered car back home. There was one problem, however. One time when I parked the car, got out, shut the door and tried locking the car with the fob-key, it wouldn't respond. I tried it a second time, and no matter how hard I pressed the fob button, the car wouldn't lock. I asked a guy for help in the parking lot.

"Did vou turn it off?"

"How can you tell?" I asked in my ignorance. "There's no sound!"

"You're new at this," the guy observed.

I nodded. When you've driven a gas-powered car all your life, trying to save the planet with an electric or hybrid car takes some getting used to.

No more sleeping in for USS students

Students at Uxbridge Secondary School will have to tumble out of bed a lot earlier starting in September.

The Durham District School Board and the Durham District Catholic School Board have agreed with a Durham Student Transportation System report that recommends USS start classes in September at 8 a.m. For the past couple of years, because of COVID-19, school classes have started at 10 a.m. Prior to the COVID-19 start time, USS classes began at 8:25 a.m.

Part of the reason for the time change, according to DSTS, is a shortage of school bus drivers. It claims the region needs about 80 or 90 more drivers.

While some claim the new start time will cause problems for parents, not all students are opposed. Carley, a USS student, said she likes the change, saying it will allow her to "do more stuff" after school and also look for a part-time job. her friend, Isabel, is also in favour.

"It will help with after-school activ-

ities," she said.

Both admitted, however, that not all their friends support the change.

The *Cosmos* reached out to USS to learn whether the bell time change would affect staffing requirements, but did not hear back before press time

Other Uxbridge schools will also be affected. Goodwood Public School will start classes at 9 a.m., 60 minutes later than usual. Quaker Village Public School will open at 8:15 a.m., 35 minutes earlier. St. Joseph Catholic School will ring the bell at 9:15 a.m., 20 minutes later than usual. There will be no changes at Uxbridge Public School or Scott Central Public School.

DSTS says the time changes result from extensive public consultation and represent a "best case under current constraints" scenario.

The Durham District School Board said, however, it is committed to exploring "long-term solutions, specifically for secondary school bell times as the group most impacted by this update."







The granular formulation of the larvicide Bacillus thuringiensis subspecies israelensis (VectoBac 200G -Registration No.18158 under the Pest Control Products Act, Canada) will be placed in temporary pools of standing water, ditches, and storm water retention ponds in areas throughout the Regional Municipality of Durham.

The granular formulation of the larvicide VectoBac 200G and/or the granular formulation of the larvicide Bacillus sphaericus (VectoLex CG - Registration No. 28008 under the Pest Control Products Act, Canada) might also be placed in sewage lagoons in areas across the Regional Municipality of Durham.

All larvicides will be applied by Ontario Ministry of the Environment, Conservation and Parks licensed applicators or trained technicians.






