### Seniors Centre lounge set to open next weekend

Many Uxbridge seniors were among the most isolated people during the darkest days of the COVID-19 pandemic. These same individuals may be glad to learn that, on May 1, the lounge at the Uxbridge Seniors Centre will be open and ready for visitors.

The Gathering Place, as the lounge is called, has been renovated with fresh paint, new flooring, improved window coverings and brand new age-specific furnishings. Perhaps best of all - the giant 72" television is available to enjoy. Residents are welcome to drop in Monday to Friday, 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. They can come alone or bring a friend to enjoy the recently refreshed room, and coffee and tea will be available on a pay-what-you-can basis.

"Making the lounge available is one more step forward as Uxbridge continues to become more age-friendly," says Councillor Bruce Garrod. "My vision was to take better advantage of this beautiful facility and have it become the go-to place for residents 55+."

On the same date, township staff will also be located in the building. Residents seeking information related to aging, and staff will be on site to provide information and answer ques-

Club, says he's excited about the full time opening of the Gathering Place.

"I've always been concerned for Uxbridge seniors who are perhaps isolated or lonely. The opening of the Gathering Place provides a safe and comfortable place for people to meet and socialize," he says.

The opening of the Gathering Place is part of a series of improvements at the Seniors Centre. The washrooms recently underwent complete renovation (paid for by the federal and provincial governments), and the now fully accessible washrooms will allow residents of all abilities to enjoy the ever-expanding services available at the Seniors Centre.

### From The Tax Office

Second Property Tax Installment is due April 27, 2022.

#### Tax Payments Options:

- In person at Town Hall during regular business hours of Monday to Friday 8:30 am to 4:30 pm. Accepted payment methods are cash, cheque, or Interac debit.
- In an after-hours Drop Box located in the Municipal Office front parking lot. DO NOT DEPOSIT CASH. Post-dated cheques are accepted.
- By Mail Payments must reach the Municipal Office by the due date.
- · Through Internet or Telephone Banking.
- · At most Financial Institutions.
- Credit cards and e-transfers are not accepted for tax payments.

#### Penalty/Interest Charges:

For non-payment of a tax levy on or before the respective due dates of each installment, a penalty of 1.25% shall be imposed on the first day of each calendar month and thereafter in which the default continues. Failure to receive a Tax Bill does not excuse the taxpayer from responsibility for payment of taxes nor liability of any penalty or interest due to late payments.

The penalty/interest charges cannot be waived or reduced by the Tax Department or Council for any reason.

If a reprinted tax bill, receipt or Statement of Account is required for any year's taxes, a fee of \$15.00 will apply.

### Short term gain may relieve another's pain

By now, most of us have received our cheque from the provincial government that reimburses us for our licence plate sticker fees. And, from those we have heard from, most of us are in agreement that these refund cheques are little more than an election ploy on the part of Doug Ford and his Conservative government. We're not sure where the billions of dollars that are going to be spent and lost on this vote-seeking venture are going to come from, and we've been a little worried about what provincial services are going to be affected by the huge financial shortfall.

We were heartened, then, to receive an email last week from Jo-Anne Gray, executive director of the Uxbridge Hospital Foundation. She wrote us a little note that contained a "good news story." Apparently a gentleman went to the hospital last Thursday and left a donation in the amount of \$440

"He explained that it was his refund from the Ministry of Transportation and that he wanted to donate it to the Uxbridge Hospital. He did not want to be acknowledged or receive an income tax receipt," wrote Jo-Anne in her email. She then went on to express how thoughtful and generous she felt the man had been.

We couldn't agree more. While we personally know of many people who can readily use the few hundred dollars that may come back to them, we are sure that there are many who almost wish the money *hadn't* been refunded. This gentleman's idea of giving his cheque to the hospital is, we feel, perfect in so many ways. Firstly, by not keeping the money, he isn't beholden in any way to Ford or his government - no matter which way he votes, his vote won't have been bought. Secondly, the donation ensures that provincial money stays in the provincial coffers. It went from the Ministry of Transportation to the Ministry of Health, a ministry that may well suffer, thanks to the MTO's largesse. So might the Ministries of Long-Term Care, which COVID proved can ill-afford it, and Education.

Thank you, kind gentleman, and thank you to all who are putting their licence sticker money back into circulation. We'll all need it in the long run.

Many thanks to the Bird Box Buddies (BBB)!

The Bird Box Buddies are a group of local residents who regularly walk the Uxbridge Countryside Preserve and monitor the bird houses. Each April and May, the Eastern bluebirds, tree swallows and house wrens arrive and start sizing up the housing

market. They're fussy, too - if the bird house isn't cleared of last year's debris, they will not empty it. That's where the Bird Box Buddies step in!

Unlike a natural tree cavity which other animals have access to and woodpeckers can create, the artificial bird house lasts for more than one season and is generally safer. Racoons, squirrels, and larger predators can be a problem; as can the very aggressive house wren. House wrens have been very successful in the Preserve, as they like a shrubby "thicket"-type habitat, such as one created by Buckthorn and Scot Pine.

The BBB monitors keep track of the nesting birds, count their eggs, the young and make sure everything is going well.

## Am I Wrong?

### All I want is a room somewhere

So sang Eliza Doolittle in the musical *My Fair Lady*. A small enough lamentation, but one that many Canadians are singing right now, except that they'd like that room in a home.

With all the crises currently bedevilling Canada, from COVID-19 to inflation to climate change, I would suggest that the housing crisis is the most troubling. Just as no one should have to go without food, no one should have to go without housing. Yet the number of people using food banks and living on the streets continues to grow. At least food banks are addressing part of the problem, but if you have no place to live, how do you cook the food you received from the food bank?

If you think this is going to be a call for more action on homelessness, you'd only be partially correct. The fact is, the housing crisis is affecting more than just the homeless: when it comes to housing, we're all at risk.

There have been numerous stories in the news in recent weeks about people being evicted from their rental accommodations, or having to move because landlords have increased rents by staggering amounts. It also appears that a lot of rental properties are being bought up by outfits bent on cornering the market, thereby giving them the wherewithal to charge whatever rents they want. Some owners of rental properties have decided it is more profitable to evict their tenants and turn the apartments in Airbnb's. Anyone living in rental housing at this time should be worried: a landlord can evict on the slightest of excuses and there is little the renter can do about it.

But home ownership is also facing serious challenges. Once again, a number of recent news items have chronicled how developers are demanding that buyers, who have already paid a deposit on a new home, pony up tens of thousands of dollars more than the original quoted price. It's hard enough for many people to buy homes these days, but it becomes damned near impossible when the price can be jacked up any time the seller wants. As for those who already own their homes, increasing property taxes, along with higher rates for utilities combined with the current rate of inflation, are pushing some families to the edge.

In the real estate business, one no longer looks for a home to buy and then asks the price. No, now one has to place a bid on the available property and hope no one bids more. A recent home sale in Toronto went for hundreds of thousands more than the original asking price, thanks to bidding.

In other words, taking all the above into consideration, it seems the housing game in Canada is more like the old wild West, where the cattle barons and railroad barons ruled the roost and got whatever they wanted. The main motivation was greed and the same could be said for Canada's housing industry. Why else would developers continue to build mini-mansions rather than small but adequate housing? Money, money, money. I'm not opposed to anyone making a fair return on their investment, but the key word in that phrase is "fair."

Politicians across the country have started talking about the housing crisis, but I'm hadpressed to find any who have actually come up with any kind of program or plan to address the situation. In fact, in some cases they make it worse. The *Toronto Star* recently carried a story about the planned Highway 413 that the Ford government intends to build from Halton to Vaughan. The story noted that five prominent Vaughan families, most of them known contributors to the Progressive Conservative Party, have been buying up property along the proposed route. More sprawl? More mini-mansions?

Maybe it's time to take a look at Britain's experience with council houses. Council houses were/are built by councils to provide affordable housing for the average Joe and Jill, with a sizable percentage set aside for rental accommodation. The houses were/are small, but not tiny. Hundreds of thousands were built, especially following the First and Second World Wars.

It seems to me that a social issue such as adequate, affordable housing should not be left entirely in the hands of developers. Somewhere, sometime, perhaps some municipality will take the lead and develop its own housing. But I won't hold my breath.

Tell me, am I wrong?

### "Sprinter" in April

It's my fault. I admit it. I changed my car tires over from winters to summers last week. And that's why we got whacked by a snow storm on Monday night. I tempted fate – figuring that mid-April wasn't too early to switch over – and I caused all this rotten winter weather three weeks into spring. Mind you, I did hear Ed Lawrence say on the radio this week that if one wants to be brave planting some hardy trees and bushes early, it's OK.

"Go for it," said Lawrence, the former *Globe and Mail* columnist and chief horticulturist to six governors-general and seven prime ministers. And he was speaking on CBC Radio's *Radio Noon* program just as winds and sleet were blowing past both his Almonte, Ont., home and mine here in Uxbridge. As usual, on the air, Lawrence was talking to avid gardeners – complaining about rabbits eating their new-growth rosebuds, revelling in compost, and querying him about how to plant a giant pumpkin seed. Anyway, Canada's voice of spring sometimes gets it wrong too. Not just me.

I started with the best of plans this past week - not just the tire changeover - when I couldn't stand the cabin fever any longer, grabbed my lawn rake, some yard-waste bags and headed out the back door to challenge the elements. And by elements I mean temperatures just above zero Celsius - not exactly gardening weather. But I had (I thought) a unique strategy, you see. I got my fire permit in the New Year. And I figured I'd bag some of the decomposing leaves, grass and dead garden stuff, but I'd also burn some of it in my mini-firepit. I burned just enough of what I'd raked to keep the fire at a steady burn, so that I from time to time I could warm my hands against the cold. It worked really well until I realized some of my smoke was drifting into neighbours' yards interfering with their outdoor Easter activities.

My next banish-winter tactic, I figured, was foolproof. "Hey, let's get the family together in our backyard on Easter Monday," I suggested to our daughters, "Let's set up the slack line and all the accessories."

They agreed and by mid-morning on Monday, our daughters and all six of their kids had arrived. Like the weekend, it was not very warm. In fact, several of the grandkids complained about how cold it was. I peeled off my jacket to work in shirt sleeves just to make the point about leaving video games and cellphones behind in favour of playing outdoors. And so, we began installing the slack line and all its doodads – rope ladder, swing, and assorted hanging handgrips. But wouldn't you know it? The moment I brought out the extension ladder to install the highest anchoring device around a tree, the winds whipped up and everything began swaying – trees, rigging, ladder and me!

"Press on," I thought. "Don't let them see you sweat with any sign of motion sickness or your acrophobia." I felt like a windjammer sailor – one hand on the rigging and the other holding onto the mast for dear life. Ultimately, we got all the ropes and accessories into place. And the kids jumped all over them, just like it was the middle of summer. So, at least part of my plan had worked. They'd left the world-wide-web at least temporarily for the great outdoors, even if it was still just a few degrees above freezing,

I was beginning to think maybe I'd misread the calendar – maybe it was December and not April. Maybe I shouldn't tempt fate and wait, like all experienced gardeners, until the Victoria Day weekend before I officially launched outdoor life. Then, I saw a couple of guys shuffling down our wind-blown street. They were wearing shorts and flipflops. "You're the cause of all this April winter," I called out to them.

"It's sprinter," one of them said. "You know, not yet spring, but still partly winter."

Eventually, I retreated inside away from the "sprinter" weather. Then it hit me. I really *am* to blame for this mixed up season. There on the floor lay my hockey skates, stick, helmet, gloves and pads – all from last week's near season-ending hockey scrimmage. And I began stowing the gear into my hockey bag. But not because hockey season is over. On the contrary. This was also the week that summer hockey begins and I had to get ready to launch that seasonal favourite recreation of mine.

Like Ed Lawrence and his eager springtime gardeners, I'm just going to go for it, no matter what the calendar says.

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# Spoon your way into Mom's heart with local artisan

Looking for an unusual gift for Mother's Day? Carve a spoon for Mom at Uxbridge wood carving artisan Shawn Hermans' Mother's Day Weekend Spoon Carving Workshop. In 2006, Hermans discovered the lathe and quickly became passionate about transforming wood into bowls, platters and other gifts.

"In the summer of 2019, I came across a book at the library called *Spoon* by Barn the Spoon," says Hermans. At that time, he only ever whittled during summer vacations

and it was while doing that when he found himself looking at photos of "beautiful spoons."

"I had never uttered those words before - 'beautiful spoons' - as I never knew they existed, but these pictures stirred something inside me," said Hermans. "I returned to my workshop that week to turn a few wooden spoons on the lathe."

Hermans says that the moment he first decided to pick up a carving knife, creating the spoon was "an experience of tranquility," and spoon carving quickly became a daily activity.

When the COVID-19 pandemic hit, and Hermans no longer needed to commute, he poured that newfound time into spoon carving.

"I was unexpectedly but pleasantly surprised that one of the greatest gifts that spoon carving has brought to me are the friendships and companionship that I've gained over the last two years."

Hermans soon became part of an online community of artisans like himself.

"The online community also consists of "Rise up and Carve," a free 24/7 Zoom meeting available to anyone that wants to 'hook up' and carve a spoon with another person from another part of the world. This experience of carving with others has been of most satisfaction personally, both socially, and for the carving skills that I've developed as a result."

Hermans already has pieces available for purchase at some local shops in Uxbridge, including at Preston Gallery and Passionate Cook's Essentials, but he is now looking to allow others to experience his passion of creating the spoons.

"My upcoming workshops are being held at the Owls Hollow, a glamping, eco-friendly camping site in Uxbridge on Mother's Day weekend - Saturday, May 7, and Sunday, May 8."

The workshop costs \$70 to participate and includes spoon design, equipment and safety, knife grips. Sharpening will be introduced, as will additional carving resources.

"I hope to share this fun and rewarding hobby with others, and will also be offering some 'Learn to Carve' workshops this spring and summer," says Hermans.
