Sore throat? Cough? Emerg shouldn't be first stop

At 2:20 p.m. on Tuesday afternoon, there were 14 people waiting to be seen in the Uxbridge Hospital Emergency Department, according to the emergency wait time clock available through oakvalleyhealth.ca The clock estimated the wait time *after* triage would be three hours. And, "due to rapidly changing demands in the Emergency Department, individuals seeking care may experience a much longer than expected wait."

Ontario - indeed, Canada - is experiencing crushing wait times in hospitals across the board, and Uxbridge Hospital is no exception. Does it have to do with COVID-19 and an advancing seventh wave? Does it have to do with staffing shortages? Is it because it's summer and everyone is just more accident prone?

Dr. Carlye Jensen, chief of Uxbridge Hospital, says that it's a combination of all of the above.

"Yes, we do have a fair amount of COVID here in Uxbridge right now, and that is driving volume (of people going to emerg to discover

if they have COVID)," says Jensen.

"It's also because many people aren't able to access other options because of all the stress that COVID has put on our health care system over the past couple of years."

She explains that many doctors and nurses are still contracting COVID-19, and that this is leading to staffing shortages, both in hospitals and in family/general medical practices.

"It isn't a matter of the provincial government needing to throw more money at the system,"



Our two cents

Too hot to handle any longer

Baby, it's hot outside. And it looks as though it's staying that way for the foreseeable future. Makes for great summer photos, splashing about in the pool and such, but not everyone is fortunate enough to have a wee pool to dunk their head in, or air conditioning to escape to.

If you're watching the news, it's not just here in Ontario. Great Britain is getting temperatures that it normally only dreams about (it registered its highest temperature *ever* on Tuesday, at 40.2 C), and forest fires are wiping out parts of England, France, Spain, Italy and Greece. It's been said that Europe is "living in a disaster movie."

Yes, that sounds like hyperbole, but how many times does this need to be witnessed both here at home and around the globe before we clue in and realize that *something needs to change*. In 1990, the first Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change (IPCC) released a statement about a potential increase in heat waves. There have been four more since then, each report containing stronger and stonger language about the world needs to limit warming NOW or face dire consequences.

Heat-induced forest fires not only wipe out desperately needed trees and vegetation, they wipe out animals, insects - whole ecosystems, every one vital to the earth's existence. Not to mention the communities that are unlucky enough to be in a fire's path.

Antonio Gutiérrez, secretary-general for the United Nations, delivered the following words at a climate change meeting in Berlin earlier this week: "Half of humanity is in the danger zone right now from floods, droughts, extreme storms and wildfires. No nation is immune. This has to be the decade of decisive climate action. We have a choice - collective action, or collective suicide."

We don't know about you, but that makes us enjoy our lemonade under a shady tree a whole lot less. If this keeps up, we won't be able to go outside and enjoy the Canadian summers we love so much. We need to get real *now* - massive social and economic change *needs* to occur, or summers at the cottage will be a thing of the past. Ambivalence is no longer an option.

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
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












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BIG MUSICAL WEEKEND IN

Get ready, Uxbridge - starting today, we are in for one big rollicking, frolicking musical weekend!

First up is the Springtide Music Festival, making it real this weekend after having been put off too many times to count by COVID. It runs from today, Thursday, July 21, through to this Saturday, July 23, at multiple venues and stages across downtown Uxbridge. Kids 12 and under who are accompanied by an adult can enjoy the festival for free on Friday and Saturday.

The festival will officially get underway with a launch party concert at the Uxbridge Music Hall, featuring Bedouin Soundclash. The Launch Party will also feature performances by Julian Taylor and local artist Tania Joy. Organizers say the launch party is a stand alone event, which means it requires a separate ticket and is not included with a weekend wristband. As of press time Tuesday, there were still a limited number of tickets available through the Springtide website. On Friday, July 22, along with over

On Friday, July 22, along with over 70 musical performances, Springtide says it is "excited to share a few specialty stages curated for maximum enjoyment!"

From 5 - 7 p.m., there will be a "Let's Write a Song" workshop, hosted by Bernadette Connors, at The Bridge Social. This is a free interactive songwriting workshop for those of all ages and all song writing abilities and experience!

Also on Friday, and new to this year's program, the Author's Stage,

hosted by Blue Heron Books in its back studio, will feature author Michael Barclay and his book "Hearts on Fire: Six Years That Changed The Canadian Music Scene". This will happen from 6 - 8 p.m., and will be hosted by former MuchMusic man Tim Deegan.

There will also be supper, compliments of the Tin Restaurant, songs by Geoff Holt, and drinks available at a cash bar. Tickets for the Author's Stage are \$25 and include all of the above plus a \$10 book coupon. For those with a Springtide wristband, tickets are \$20. All tickets for the Author's Stage can be purchased at Blue Heron Books.

Saturday, July 23, also promises a full day of music and activities. The Interview Stage, curated by Tamara Williamson, will take place at The Bridge Social. At 3 p.m., will be the Fire Songs Session, a conversation all about community with Hollowsage, Allanah Kemp and Kevin Ker, hosted by Josh Veens. At 4 p.m., the Up Close And Too Personal Session, hosted by experienced host Blair Packham. This session delves into the lives of our guests; including Gravley James and Joel Saunders. And at 5 p.m., will be the One Song session, hosted by Tamara Williamson, where artists Suitcase Sam, Stephen Stanley and Rebekah Hawker have chosen a favourite song that they have written and will dive into the process of writing it, their inspiration, and the story behind the lyrics. This event is open to all those with a festival wristband.

The younger set can head to the Youth Stage, hosted by Uxbridge's

own Amy Peck. The 2022 Springtide Youth Stage will include performances by six solo acts, as well as a special performance by Youth Stage alumni Nate Hobor.

"You won't believe the talent, mad skills, and musicianship that these performers will bring to the Youth Stage," say festival organizers.

These young will be performing at the Uxbridge Legion on Saturday, July 22, from 2 - 5 p.m. Entry is free with a Saturday wristband or \$10 at the door.

If all that carousing hasn't made you drop, on Sunday, head over to the Elgin Park Rotary Bandshell for the Uxbridge Scottish Festival Concert.

Several small steps for mankind

Gurdeep Pandher.

Some of you will recognize the name, some of you won't. Given the current state of the world, those who do know the name will likely understand why I watch this man's videos on the internet almost daily. Amidst the never-ending parade of news stories about a world gone mad, Pandher's videos are a brief respite from mass shootings, weather out of control, armed conflict, hate-filled rhetoric and (quite literally) insane politicians.

For the unenlightened, let me explain briefly. Pandher is a Sikh-Canadian who lives in a tiny cabin in the Yukon wilderness. For the last few years, he has been posting videos of himself performing traditional Punjabi dances. No over-the-top production features,

no flashy costumes, no back-up band, just Pandher doing his energetic, exuberant dances, usually outside his cabin, both in the heat of summer and in the depths of winter.

As he ex-

plains in all his videos, his dances are an attempt to spread joy, hope and positivity to his fellow man. And watching him dance with unreserved happiness does, indeed, give me joy, hope and positivity, even if only momen-

His videos have gained a world-wide audience and he was one of the featured performers at the Canada Day festivities in Ottawa. He currently is on a cross-Canada journey, dancing at locations such as Peggy's Cove and the Halifax Gardens. He has been joined in his dances by a wide assortment of guests, from members of the Canadian Armed Forces to politicians to reporters to everyday folks. Pandher has no political message to deliver,

rich and the poor get poorer. If only for a few minutes each day, Pandher's infectious energy takes me away from all that doom and gloom.

There's an old saying, sometimes attributed to Mark Twain: "Dance like no one is watching." Pandher does just that, even though he knows thousands are watching his videos. In some respects, one can almost see the child inside him just letting loose with no self-consciousness. His dances are, in fact, joy, hope and positivity personified.

It seems to me that what the world desperately needs right now is a whole lot more Gurdeep Pandhers.

How do I get to Yorkville? Practise!

Friday afternoons in the mid-1960s had a special rhythm for me. While most of my high-school pals gathered in the corridors to plot their party plans for the weekend, I left class early to catch the Sheppard Avenue bus west from Agincourt. With my trumpet case in hand, about 5 o'clock I caught the southbound Yonge Street bus, then the subway from Eglinton to Bloor. And then I walked west on Yorkville Avenue into what everybody called "the Village." There, just before Avenue Road, I climbed up a back-alley fire-escape staircase to a third-floor rehearsal studio.

"Hi, Donny," I'd call out to my trumpet teacher Don Johnson.

"Come warm up that horn," he'd tell me. It took me a few visits in 1965 to discover I had climbed to the top of a Yorkville landmark, and an even more important music mecca. Between reciting my trumpet scales and playing whatever tunes Johnson had had me rehearse that week – such as Yesterdays or Shadow of Your Smile - Donny explained that our upstairs rehearsal studio, after hours, was actually a small folk music club known as the Frozen Onion. Meanwhile, below our feet, he told me, was the famous Purple Onion Coffee House, called a coffee house because when it opened in 1960 it had no liquor licence. The Onion, Donny claimed, was the birthplace of the Yorkville folk scene.

"(The owners) charged \$1 memberships and cover fees of \$1.50 to \$3," reported the Toronto Star, for people to see such littleknown artists as Ian and Sylvia Tyson, Carly Simon (who performed with her sister Lucy Simon) and the house band – none other than Luke (Gibson) and The Apostles. In his book The History of Canadian Rock 'n' Roll, Bob Mersereau contends that singer-songwriter Buffy Sainte-Marie had just seen U.S. Army soldiers returning from Vietnam and soon after, at the Purple Onion, sat down and composed her famous protest song Universal

"If you remember the'60s," Grace Slick or George Harrison is supposed to have quipped, "then you weren't really there."

Well, I travelled to the Village in the 1960s every Friday evening and then some, and I learned a lot. I learned that I liked going there. I met the principals of the burgeoning Yorkville music scene – artists, managers, club impresarios and fans - and discovered that I

wanted to write newspaper and magazine features about the musicians, the music and the lore. "Bands that played there," Mersereau wrote, "found local and sometimes national success in Yorkville." And those of us who covered the scene there - Peter Goddard, Wilder Penfield III, Martin Melhuish and Ritchie Yorke - all cut our teeth on popmusic writing by following up-and-coming artists we discovered there.

Like all music reviewers and feature writers we tried to meet the club managers who got us into the venues - the Onion, the Penny Farthing, Boris's Red Gas Room and the Riverboat. Bernie Fiedler opened the Riverboat in 1964 and managed to attract almost every major player on the folk music circuit. I covered one of John Prine's first appearances there and emerging star Kris Kristofferson, whom Fiedler billed as a "country folk artist" from Brownsville, Texas. I remember the night he played the Riverboat, Kristofferson complained on stage that he couldn't pick a guitar very well. But otherwise he was pretty self-assured. When I interviewed him in the tiny Green Room atop the club, he told me, "I'll drink a shot of tequila. Then, you drink one and I'll answer your questions." I'm sure my reporting professor at Ryerson would've been horrified, but I agreed and got (I think) some memorable material for the Globe and Mail review. For Prine and Kristofferson, stops at clubs in Toronto offered pin money between bigger gigs in Los Angeles or New York. For Canadians Yorkville was pivotal.

"Every nation has a capital, and for Canada's music nation it was Yorkville Village," Mersereau wrote. "If you wanted to be a successful musician in Canada, you had to go to Yorkville, make a name for yourself, and then go to the States."

To inspire me back in the '60s, my trumpet teacher Don Johnson pointed out that the Purple Onion (downstairs from our rehearsal studio The Frozen Onion) had also once booked a duet called the Two Tones, featuring a relatively new folkie from Orillia, Ontario, named Gordon Lightfoot. If I'd only tried harder at playing music in Yorkville, instead of reviewing music in Yorkville, imagine where my career might have taken me.

says Jensen, "it's that there aren't physically enough bodies, or enough time, to see to everyone who needs to be seen."

Volumes at the Uxbridge Hospital Emergency Department have been high enough recently to prompt a release from the communications department of Oak Valley Health requesting that news sources such as the Cosmos, inform residents of options when considering emergency medical care.

- Individuals who are registered with a family physician/practitioner should seek non-urgent care through their office before coming to the hos-

Telehealth Ontario is a free, confidential service that can be reached at 1-866-797-0000 to get health advice or information 24 hours a day, seven days a week. Assistance is available in more than 300 languages.

- The COVID Assessment Centre (CAC) is

still operating every weekday from 12 - 4 p.m. in Prince Albert.

"This centre is way under-utilized," says Jensen. "We can't assess you at the hospital or a doctor's office the way we can at the CAC. If you have a cough or cold, assume that you have COVID, go to the CAC and get assessed." Learn more at covid19swab.lh.ca

Jensen points out that there is always one doctor and two nurses at the Uxbridge Hospital Emergency Department at any time, and that the department has offered relatively good wait times of late.

'We've made a good name for ourself here, I think," she says with a laugh. "On the weekend, I was in, and I would speculate that at least 30 - 40 per cent of the patients we had in were not from Uxbridge, they were from out of town. We can't fault them for that, though. Wouldn't you do the same thing if you weren't well, and wanted to wait the least amount of time to be seen?"

If unsure whether the severity of your condition qualifies as an emergency, err on the side of caution and visit the emergency department. Below are some examples of when to head to the ER: Abdominal pain; a broken bone or wound requiring stitches; chest pain; tightness in the chest; continuous vomiting or severe diarrhea with signs of dehydration; difficulty breathing; an infant under three months old with fever over 38.5C/101F, or has a fever and is difficult to wake; seizures; stiff neck and sensitivity to light.

Finally, Jensen requests that, if a visit to emerg is necessary, then "please be patient and kind to the staff who are working. They are already feeling awful about not being able to see you as quickly as both you and they would like, and they're working as hard as they can. A little kindness can go a long way."



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
